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Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Inc. acknowledges the Gadigal people of the Eora nation, the traditional custodians of the land on which we work. We pay respect to their Elders: past, present and emerging.

Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Inc. (Connect) is a not-for-profit organisation, which has been providing transport services since 1983. We believe in equal access so everyone can access the facilities and services they need.

We are an association registered in NSW under the Associations Incorporation Act (2009) and are a registered charity with the Australian Charities and Notfor-profits Commission.

Connect provides a door to door transportation service for seniors, people who need help getting out and about, people with a disability and other eligible people who can't afford or have difficulty accessing private or public transport.

Community Transport services in NSW are determined by where you live or as allocated by My Aged Care assessors. Our services are generally for those people living in the former Leichhardt and Marrickville Local Government Areas (now part of the Inner West Council). These include the suburbs of Annandale, Balmain, Balmain East, Birchgrove, Leichhardt, Lilyfield, Rozelle, Dulwich Hill, Enmore, Lewisham, Marrickville, Petersham, St Peters, Stanmore, Sydenham, Tempe and some parts of Newtown and Camperdown.

Connect services are primarily funded under two different programs:

- The Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP), which is focused on older people who need help getting out and about, and
- The NSW Community Transport Program (CTP) which is aimed at those who are "Transport Disadvantaged". This is when you have limited or no access to private transport and can't make use of 'conventional' transport, like buses or trains. Unlike CHSP, these services are available to a person of any age, with or without a disability.

Connect is a registered National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) provider and is able to provide services for people with a disability under the age of 65. Our NDIS services are not geographically constrained to the Inner West.

We also provide transport to the recipients of Home Care Packages (HCP) under contract with their respective HCP providers. Our HCP services are not geographically restrained to the Inner West.

We are passionate about providing a range of tailored transport options, enabling people to not only access the facilities and services they need, but to participate in community life and social activities, remaining as active and independent as possible.

In the 2021/22 financial year, despite almost 6 months under lockdown, we provided approximately 25,000 trips to Connect clients. Our services include individual and group transport to medical and personal appointments and shops, shopping trips, shuttle services, social activities and recreational outings.








### **Moving House**

The 'Support at Home' program has been under development for a couple of years now, with an original planned introduction of 1 July 2023. It is intended to replace the Commonwealth Home Support Program CHSP (most of Connect clients fall under this scheme), Home Care Packages and the Short – Term Restorative Care Program.

It is with pleasure that I present the Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Inc. ('Connect') Chair's Report for the 2021 – 2022 financial year.

For the last two years, I have written about the challenges of the Covid pandemic. As the General Manager has noted, this continued into the 2021 – 2022 financial year, with greater Sydney subject to Public Health Orders restricting movement for almost six months. I am again proud to say, that Connect once again accepted the challenges posed by Covid, and continued delivery of essential services to our valued clients and local community.

After achieving and exceeding our contractual trip KPIs with TfNSW for the first time in 2020/21, it was disappointing but of course understandable that this did not occur in 2021/22.

With essential travel only permitted for the first half of the year, the Board recognised that it was vital for Connect to maintain and support its dedicated workforce in order to resume our high quality service as soon as possible. Come the new year, Connect was ready for action!

While Covid disrupted normal operations, much work was done on progressing the 2021 – 2023 Strategic Plan. The Board's focus remains on client service, financial viability, staffing, and good governance.

One thing that unfortunately persists in challenging form is achieving long term financial sustainability. Re-launching Connect's NDIS business is one strategic aim that has commenced. Connect continues its efforts to broaden its income base, and actively manages its operating costs.

In late June 2022, Connect was offered, and accepted a new 12-month contract with TfNSW to continue provide community transport services effective 1 July 2022. Short-term contracts continue to provide planning and investment uncertainty not just for Connect, but all community transport providers across NSW.

Through the year, Connect allocated resources to assess the impact of the proposed 'Support at Home' program on the organisation's financial viability. On the information we had, our analysis indicated that Connect had a very narrow path to financial viability in this program. The new funding model would likely have impacted negatively on the quality of support we currently provide our valued clients in the inner west.



# Chair's Report

Connect participated in sector wide advocacy against the proposed 'Support at Home' in addition to making its own representations. While it is pleasing that the proposed 'Support at Home' introduction has been pushed back to 1 July 2024 pending review, contract uncertainty is never more than 12 months away.

Through the year, the Board continued to meet via Zoom. The Board membership was stable and my colleagues and I continue to develop a deeper understanding of the community sector. The Board is supported in its role through the provision of detailed management and financial reports. I thank my Board colleagues for their contribution.

I would like to acknowledge the management and staff of Connect for their dedicated work through another difficult and challenging year

Finally, I would like to recognise our clients. Thank you for your continued support.

# energ Manager's Rebor

The 2021–2022 financial year has been another eventful period. It seems such a long time ago, but we spent most of the first half of the year under lockdown. Again, this had a significant impact on Connect services, staff and clients.



With Public Health Orders in place restricting movement across greater Sydney, Connect, like all other metropolitan community transport providers, saw a significant downturn in our activity as measured by 'trips'.

Notwithstanding, as an essential service, we continued to provide our shopping and medical transport to clients. There was a significant staff focus on cleaning, maintaining distancing as best we could and the wearing of PPE such as masks.

As restrictions lifted toward the end of 2021, clients were keen to get out and about socially. Despite astonishing levels of rainfall through 2022, staff (and clients of course) persevered with organising, delivering and enjoying our popular social program.

I was pleased the Board agreed to support staff through the pandemic. Connect invests heavily in staff recruitment, orientation and on the job training and support. Unlike many employers, Connect did not let any staff go, mindful of the need to resume high quality services at scale at the appropriate time. Connect was able to do this by drawing on its own financial reserves and through various job support programs.

It is worth noting that should the proposed 'Support at Home' program that was to be introduced on 1 July 2023 have been in place through 2021/22, Connect would have been unlikely to have made it through as a financially viable business.

Organisations in community transport, meals, respite, and social support sectors have high fixed overheads which do not change regardless of whether one or one hundred services are provided. As mentioned in our 'Year in Review', Connect campaigned against the proposed 'Support at Home' program. It is pleasing that this proposed program has now been pushed back to 1 July 2024 pending further review.

In May 2021, Connect moved into new premises on Sydenham Rd Marrickville. Having spent over 10 years at the former premises in Carrington Rd, Marrickville, the time was right to move on.

Two objectives were achieved with this move:

- · manage overhead costs; and
- provide a safer working environment for staff.

Thanks to Connect's dedicated and efficient team, our move was achieved without disruption to services.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of all staff for the work they have put in this year to keep the show on the road. Well done!

Finally, I would like to thank the Chair and Directors of the Board for their ongoing commitment to their local community.

# aneral Manager's Report

### After another year disrupted by Covid, Connect has finished the 2021/22 year strongly recording a surplus.

This surplus of \$328,225 would have been higher without the non-recurring expenses associated with Connect's relocation, and the extraordinary impact external factors had on Connect's long term ethical investment accounts.

While there is a strong surplus, recurrent funding is subject to change from year to year. This year saw Connect fund annual wage increases for staff as the Equal Remuneration Order support of ten years standing ceased. The practical effect of small cuts in funding such as this, is to reduce funding available for client support in real terms. Advocacy for both clients and community sector organisations like Connect becomes more and more important where funding is uncertain and subject to political debate.

As the first half of the year was spent more or less under lockdown, fares, bus and driver hire income were down from 2020/2021. Employee and other operating expenses were also down in comparison to 2020/2021, reflecting the delivery of essential services only.

It is worth noting the Board declined to reduce employee headcount in order to maintain a connected workforce for when restrictions eventually lifted. While Connect has had some staffing issues on occasion this year, some other providers have struggled.

Both the Chair and the General Manager have noted the effect that short - term contracts have on planning. The combination of a series of short-term contracts with TfNSW and Covid has resulted in some cautiousness in investing in new vehicles. One area of investment interest to be pursued in 2022/23 is that of electric vehicles. The inner west operating area is ideally suited to these type of vehicles.

While Covid has affected Connect again, accessing Commonwealth financial support has seen the organisation finish the year in a strong cash position. My colleagues and I carefully continue to monitor and review organisational finances.

I would like to thank my colleagues on the Board for their support, the General Manager and his staff for their hard work and dedication, Connect clients and the local community.

### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

For the Year Ended 30 June 2022

The financial report covers Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Incorporated as an individual entity. Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Incorporated is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 30 June 2022 were to provide transport options to the community of the Inner West of Sydney.

The functional and presentation currency of Connect: Inner West Community Transport Group Incorporated is Australian dollars

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

### 1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of those charged with Governance the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements and material accounting policies all comply with the recognition and measurement requirements in Australian Accounting Standards.

### 2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

### (a) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

### (b) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for significantly less than fair value have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

### **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

### (b) Property, plant and equipment

### Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

### **Depreciation rate**

Motor Vehicles

Up to 20%

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

### (c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

### (d) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits, those benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements.

### (e) Provisions

### **Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

Those charged with governance make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.
