OUR HISTORY

Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. (LCTG) has been delivering community transport services since 1983 and over the years has expanded and adapted its services to meet the needs of local communities. In the 2017/18 financial year, we provided over 30,000 trips to approximately 2,000 clients. Our services include individual and group transport options to hospitals, appointments, and shops; shopping buses and outings; shuttle services; and social/recreational outings.

LCTG has a staff team of around eighteen drivers and bus assistants, resourced by a team of around five office-based staff providing client liaison, scheduling, service coordination, fleet management, administration, and management.

The governing body LCTG is a skills-based volunteer Management Committee comprised of individuals with relevant expertise and a strong commitment to locally based community transport services.

LCTG is currently funded by the Commonwealth Department of Social Services; NSW Department of Family and Community Services, Ageing Disability and Home Care; and Transport for NSW (TfNSW).

ABOUT US

LCTG is a not-for-profit organisation, providing low-cost individual and group transport services for transport disadvantaged people living in the former Local Government Areas of Leichhardt and Marrickville. Our services are aimed at those who cannot use public transport due to frailty, disability or other access issues, and who do not have access to other affordable options. Through the delivery of a range of tailored transport options, LCTG enables people to participate in community life and social activities, and remain as active and independent as possible.

We believe in equal access so everyone can access the facilities and services they need.

We provide services for people living in the former Leichhardt and Marrickville Local Government Areas (now part of the Inner West Council). These include the suburbs of Annandale, Balmain, Birchgrove, Leichhardt, Lilyfield, Rozelle, part of Camperdown (part located within City of Sydney), Dulwich Hill, Enmore, Lewisham, Marrickville, a small part of Mascot (mostly located within the city of Botany Bay), part of Newtown (part located within City of Sydney), Petersham, Stanmore, Sydenham and Tempe.

NSW Community Transport services in NSW are determined by where you live or as allocated by My Aged Care assessors.

Our services are funded under two different programs;

- The Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP), and
- The Community Transport Program (CTP)

Clients also contribute to the cost of service.

STRUCTURE & MANAGEMENT

Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. is an association registered in NSW under the Associations Incorporation Act (2009). It is also registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC).

Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. has an elected Management Committee who oversee the strategic direction and performance of the organisation. The Management Committee is comprised of individuals with relevant expertise and a strong commitment to locally - based community transport services.

The Executive Officer reports to the Management Committee. The Executive Officer is responsible for a team of around eighteen drivers and bus assistants, resourced by a team of around five office-based staff providing client liaison, scheduling, service coordination, fleet management, and administration services to around 2,000 clients.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. (LCTG) President's Report for the 2017 – 2018 financial year.

Our organisation continues to provide an enriching, community building service to its clients in the inner west, primarily in the former Leichhardt and Marrickville Local Government Areas. While a relatively small organisation when compared to other metropolitan community transport providers particularly our neighbouring services, I am pleased to note that we punch well above our weight in terms of customer satisfaction. Research shows our client satisfaction and trust levels exceed industry benchmarks. This is testament to the dedication and care of the staff of LCTG.

While 2017 – 2018 has been relatively stable, there were some challenges along the way.

Through 2017 – 2018, the Executive Officer Michael Doyle was largely absent through illness, eventually retiring in late 2017 due to ill health. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge Michael's contribution during his five-year tenure with LCTG.

Through this challenging time, the Service Coordinator Julie Saunders, was instrumental in keeping the organisation functioning on a day to day basis. I thank Julie for her contribution to LCTG over many years and particularly for her willingness to step up as acting Executive Officer under difficult circumstances.

This year also saw LCTG begin to use the C-TABS booking and client management system, popularly known as RouteMatch. Use of the system was mandated under our community transport services contract with TfNSW. The system is acknowledged to have some issues and LCTG, like many other community transport providers had a bumpy ride with RouteMatch earlier this year. I am pleased to say that LCTG is now functioning effectively although as an organisation, there is still some work to do in optimising RouteMatch so it best meets our needs.

In February 2018, Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. was fortunate to engage a new Executive Officer, Brett Andrews. Brett has been working closely with the Management Committee on Strategic and Business Plans for the three-year period 2017 - 2020. These are now in place and Brett and his team are confidently working toward our strategic goals. You can find these goals in this report.

After a period of higher than desirable Management Committee membership turnover, I have been fortunate to work with a stable, primarily skills based Management Committee over the last 12 months. It is a diverse group united in their commitment to locally-based community transport services. I thank my colleagues on the Management Committee for their dedication and commitment

I would like to acknowledge LCTG staff. We have a team of around eighteen drivers and bus assistants, resourced by a team of around five office-based staff who provide client liaison, scheduling, service coordination, fleet management, and administration services to our clients.

Providing mobility services is simple. Providing community transport services however is a surprisingly complex business, increasingly so as compliance measures increase year on year.

Despite this, LCTG staff continue to deliver exemplary, trustworthy, safe and reliable services to our community. On behalf of my colleagues on the Management Committee and clients, I thank the staff (and volunteers from time to time) of LCTG.

Before I close, I acknowledge the continued funding of our service by the NSW and Commonwealth Governments without which we would not survive.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge our clients. Your zest for life, your smarts, humour and resilience are a great joy to all of us at LCTG.

But this is what it is all about – our clients are members of our local community and their views contribute and matter to me and to LCTG as a community-based organisation.

Community transport is a complex environment especially for newcomers to the sector. I would like to acknowledge my LCTG colleagues for assisting me in understanding LCTG, the business, and community transport operations generally, particularly Julie Saunders and Kevin Barwick. Colleagues in other community transport organisations have also been very generous with their time and support and I express my appreciation for this. Such generosity reflects very well on the community transport sector.

Finally, I would like to thank President Simon Emsley and his colleagues on the Management Committee for the opportunity to manage LCTG and lead it as its Executive Officer into the future.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As the Treasurer of Leichhardt Community Transport Group Inc. it gives me great pleasure to present the organisation's financial statements for the 2017 – 2018 financial year.

There was a surplus of \$82,754 in 2018 compared to a deficit of \$8,785 in 2017.

Total income from all sources in 2018 was \$1,651,541, an increase of \$98,955 over 2017. This increase consisted primarily of state and commonwealth grant income. The introduction of the NDIS and changes to Commonwealth Home Support Scheme have resulted in smaller grant income growth than we would like.

Total expenditure was \$1,561,788, an increase of just \$416 over 2017. While this is pleasing, the primary reason for this was lower salary expenditure as staff positions were unfilled for some of the year. Our administration costs though were well controlled, increasing by just \$7,385 over 2017.

The balance sheet at 30 June 2018 shows net assets of \$1,567,228, reflecting the organisation's sound financial position.

In May 2017, the Management Committee determined to invest a modest amount of this surplus in furtherance of the organisation's strategic goals in the 2018 – 2019 financial year.

As Treasurer, I would like to thank the President and my other colleagues on the Management Committee for their contribution and support. I would also like to thank the staff of LCTG who have assisted me in my role as Treasurer: Kevin Barwick, Julie Saunders and Brett Andrews.

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Note 1 This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act N.S.W. The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost. All items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time asset is held ready for use. Profits and losses on disposal of plant and equipment are taken into account in determining the result for the year.

(b) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount.

Contributions are made by the Association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred

Opinion
